Online Workshop Overview

Once the planning and mechanics are in place for leading small-group guided reading, the next step is to utilize this instructional time for targeted and intentional teaching that addresses the unique needs of each child. - Gain ideas for how to employ effective teacher language that can be used during guided reading to teach, prompt, and reinforce.
- Learn intervention strategies designed to help readers progress to the next level.



Three reasons to attend this workshop
